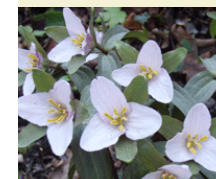

S Woodland Garden

Spinners is a peaceful woodland garden overlooking Lymington river valley. There is plenty to explore in its two acres, including collections of Hydrangeas, Acers, Hostas, Erythroniums, Trilliums, Rodgersias and Ferns.

The Garden is a must-see for plant lovers; its reputation is such that it has been the subject of numerous press articles and four television programmes. There is something for everyone to enjoy from the less common and rare trees, shrubs and herbaceous plants to the huge range of unusual shade bulbs - especially Trilliums and Erythroniums - as well as the moisture-loving plants featured in the bog garden.



RHS Recommended Garden



The garden which was started by Peter Chappell some fifty years ago is now owned by Andrew and Vicky Roberts and continues to develop. New areas are being planted up in the lower garden, which can now be explored.

Rhododendrons and Camellias are the mainstay at the top of the garden where the soil is very poor, selected to give interest for long periods by concentrating on foliage and not just flowers. Lower down the scene changes and a clay subsoil provides a home for plants such as Rodgersias and Hostas in some quantity and diversity.



S Bog garden



Wetter areas welcome Royal Ferns, Candelabra Primulas, Lysichitons, moisture-loving Iris and other denizens of the bog garden.

On the drier, sunny slopes in front of the house Cranesbills (Geraniums) provide foreground planting to rare shrubs such as the purple Judas Tree, Magnolias and Eucryphias. A large collection of Hydrangeas give interest later in the season until the Japanese maples provide the final burst of colour.

All planting is carefully considered to enhance the natural woodland scene.
